



Passenger Record Soars to New Heights!

2015 was a banner year for passenger traffic at GFIA. Every single month we broke records, some of which had stood since 2010, by amounts ranging from 5.2% to 14.95%. July was our busiest month ever, serving more than 234 thousand passengers. We reached the two million passenger mark a month earlier than ever before, and ended the year serving *2,550,193* travelers!

"The past few years have been tremendous for the Gerald R. Ford International Airport, and we could not be more thrilled by the support received from our area business and leisure travelers who are choosing to fly to and from the Ford Airport," said GFIA



Executive Director Brian Ryks. "The strong growth is also drawing the attention of our airline partners as we work with them to add seats and flights to both existing and new destinations."

Passengers numbers weren't the only factor that saw a year-over-year increase for 2015 either. Total cargo activity (enplaned and deplaned mail and freight) also increased over 2014. In total, the airport saw 82,594,563 pounds of cargo come through last year that's more than 226K thousand pounds per day!

Allegiant Launches Nonstop FLL Service

Allegiant's seasonal flights from Grand Rapids to Fort Lauderdale took off on December 16, marking the return of the highly anticipated service for West Michigan travelers. The seasonal flights will operate twice weekly from December 2015 through April 2016 out of the Gerald R. Ford International Airport (GRR).



"We're pleased to bring back seasonal service to Fort Lauderdale and re-open a popular destination for Michigan travelers," said Jude Bricker, Allegiant Travel Company senior vice president of planning. "We saw strong demand for Fort Lauderdale flights after our brief hiatus, and we're happy to make affordable vacations in Fort Lauderdale possible once again."

Allegiant Air, known for its exceptional travel deals, is now flying to six destinations out of the Gerald R. Ford International Airport.

"We are thrilled to welcome Allegiant's inaugural flights to and from Fort Lauderdale, Florida, and what perfect timing as holiday travel and Michigander's migration south kicks into gear," said Gerald R. Ford International Airport Executive Director Brian Ryks. "With six nonstop destinations from the Gerald R. Ford International Airport, our partnership with Allegiant providing low-cost flights continues to grow."

Laura Genovich felt the giving spirit at the Gerald R. Ford International Airport during the Thanksgiving holiday weekend thanks to an "Airport Angel." Genovich received a call the day before Thanksgiving telling her that her mom had a stroke at her home in Florida. She quickly found a ticket and booked a flight on American Airlines to Orlando. Unfortunately, the flight had a mechanical issue and had to return to the gate.

Running out of time as she sat on the plane trying to make other arrangements with tears running down her face, Genovich met Mary. Mary was sitting in front of her and said, "I've been listening to you for the last hour, and I've been praying for you and your family. I am not leaving your side until you are on a plane to Orlando," Genovich recounted.

Genovich found a nonstop flight to Orlando on Southwest, but only had a few short minutes to get down the concourse and board. When they got to the gate counter, all passengers and crew were on the plane and Southwest Airlines agent, Gayle Mutchler, was the only person in the gate area.

Mutchler told Genovich the flight was getting ready to leave, but knew by the tears in her eyes that Genovich needed to make the flight. Mutchler quickly processed tickets for Genovich and her infant daughter. It was then that Mary, the Airport Angel, stepped in again. Mary paid for Genovich's ticket,

hugged her and told her, "I love you, and the Lord loves you." Mutchler, in turn, paid it forward to Mary by giving her a Southwest Airlines voucher for a future flight.

Genovich said both crews from Southwest Airlines and American Airlines were friendly & accommodating, even noting that a few of the luggage handlers were running from one plane to another to make sure her luggage, stroller and pack-and-play made the flight with her.

Genovich made it to Orlando safely and got to spend a few days with her mom before she passed away on December 3. When Genovich

landed she also had an email from Gayle, her Southwest agent in Grand Rapids. It read: "I was the gate agent for Southwest Airlines in Grand Rapids working the flight to Orlando. I wanted to let you know that all of us here in Grand Rapids are sending you good thoughts and prayers. I hope everything gets better for you very soon, and we send our greatest condolences."

Runway Project Earns Award of Excellence

Runway 8L/26R was completely reconstructed in 2015 including a new asphalt surface. Under prime contractor Kalin Construction, Michigan Paving and Materials placed 14,700 tons of asphalt on the runway which received an Award of Excellence from the Asphalt Paving Association of Michigan. The runway received the highest ranking of all asphalt projects evaluated by the organization throughout Michigan in 2015. The project engineering was Grand Rapids based Prein&Newhof.

"While we don't complete our airport projects for the accolades, it is rewarding to be honored for a job well done," states Brian Ryks, GFIA Executive Director.

Gateway Transformation

Gateway Transformation Project construction began in December 2015 and is slated to continue through summer 2017. The project's main feature is the consolidated passenger security checkpoint which will centralize and combine security screening to one main checkpoint in the Airport. Design also includes new restrooms, lights and terrazzo flooring, retail and food and beverage space.
