Some Bright Ideas Actually Cost Less

The Gerald R. Ford International Airport (GFIA) was recently recognized for having one of the best and most energy-efficient airports in the region. Consumers Energy presented a rebate check for \$151,631 to the Gerald R. Ford International Airport, as part of the company's energy-efficiency program, which is saving the airport energy and money.

GFIA received the rebates for six projects totaling \$151,631 and 2,140,991 kilowatt hours in annual savings – enough electricity to power nearly 300 Michigan homes for a year. The six projects included the most recent completion of the Gateway Transformation Project Phase One, work in the Airport's parking garage, and upgrades in the Field Maintenance and Airport Rescue Fire Fighting facilities.

"Our airport is proud to receive recognition for being energy efficient, and we are grateful to have partners like Consumers Energy who help us recognize areas where we can improve and be more resourceful," said GFIA President & CEO Jim Gill. "As we continue to expand our footprint during upcoming construction and make technology


Passengers Tailgate Before Spring Break!

upgrades and improvements, we want to be as green as possible."

Consumers Energy has helped Michigan customers save more than \$1.5 billion through energy-efficiency projects since 2009.

"Our commitment to world class performance delivering hometown service means we work every day helping customers like GFIA with creative solutions to reduce energy consumption. This is good for the planet, and also lowers energy bills which ultimately benefits Michigan's economy," said Lisa Gustafson, executive director of business customer care for Consumers Energy, who presented the airport it's check.

As the airport continues with new projects, additional energy-saving features are built into the designs (see **Apron Reconstruction Begins** on page 3) so there will be plenty more savings in the future.

Medal of Honor

Our airport sees thousands of people coming and going each day, but on March 22^{nd} a hero returned to the Ford Airport with a welcome fit for a king.

94-year-old Al Johnson, a World War II Veteran, was flying back home to Grand Rapids from Washington, D.C. after receiving a Congressional Gold Medal, the highest



civilian honor in the nation. Patriot Guard Riders, family members, and airport guests donned flags and applauded as Johnson came through the exit from the concourse.

Tears filled Johnson's eyes as he walked through the parade line, saying he never thought he would be recognized for his service because of the secrecy of the organization he was with. Johnson was a part of the Office of Strategic Services during the war, the predecessor to the CIA. Much of the information involving OSS, including who served in it, was classified until 2008.

Johnson showed off his heavy gold medal to reporters, Patriot Guard, and family members that greeted him in



Aircraft Apron Reconstruction Project

In early April, work began on the \$30.2 million aircraft apron reconstruction project. The apron is the area where aircraft are parked, unloaded, loaded, and refueled. The existing pavement was installed in piecemeal fashion over the last five decades since the airport was first developed at this location. As the airport terminal expanded, more pavement was added to accommodate new gates, new apron space, and new taxiways and runways. Runways and taxiways, which receive the heaviest usage have been rebuilt over the years, and now we are addressing the aircraft apron.

This work will be done over two construction seasons (2018 & 2019) to accommodate both the winter weather of Michigan and the need to maintain a completely functioning airfield for daily operations. The project will be completed in seven phases, with a few airline gates closed at a time when needed to accommodate the work. All flight activity will be handled at alternate gates during the temporary closures in coordination with our airline partners.

In addition to the new pavement, significant infrastructure work is included in this project that will prepare the airport for future development.



Major Features Include:

- Removal of the existing concrete pavement (outlined in red);
- Replacement with 153,000 square yards of new concrete for future airport development and aircraft loadings; — the amount of concrete needed to pave a 250 mile stretch of sidewalk from GFIA to the Mackinac Bridge!
- » Upgraded stormwater drainage system and underground utilities to accommodate for future airport development;
- » Installation of all new LED apron lighting to reduce energy usage.
